There is among the Psalms a song written by an unknown poet to celebrate that great day when the Ark of the Covenant was brought home to the newly built temple. First the poet reflects upon David's vow to build a dwelling-place for the Lord. "I will not give sleep to mine eyes...until I find out a place for the Lord" (Psalm 132:4&5). In verse 6 he refers to the "wanderings" of the Ark, which dwelled in several lowly places during the years when there was no tabernacle.

Verse 14 is a very beautiful verse. The Psalmist has God speaking as though to accept the temple for His home: "This is my rest forever: here will I dwell; for I have desired it."

Think of it! God has chosen Zion to be His rest forever. Why is this so meaningful for us today? Because the temple is long gone. God did not mean that an earthly palace of stone and cedar would be His rest forever. He meant the church, which in Hebrews 12:22 is called Mount Zion, and in 1 Timothy 3:15 the "house of the living God."

God dwells forever in His people, in the blood-bought bride of Christ, in the hearts of the believers who are "accepted in the beloved." Oh, that we may "enter into His rest" and be part of the church where God will dwell forever!
